2 BG Press employees held Clue of SSC exam question leak found

Police is believed to have found the clue of the question paper leakage of the ongoing SSC examinations and arrested two employees of the BG Press on Wednesday, reports UNB.

The arrested are: Kamaluddin alias Suja Mia alias Menik, of Mirsarai in Chittagong district, a question paper binder of BG Press, and Abul Hashem of Chhagalnaiya in Feni, a porter of BG Press.

Kamaluddin is Hashem's brother-in-law (cousin's husband).

Both of them will be produced in the court today (Thursday) for police remand.

Earlier, a 5-member joint team of CID and SB, headed by Senior Superintendent of Special Branch Golam Kibria, was formed to in-

vestigate into the leakage of question papers.

Other members of the team are: ASP Khalur Rahman and ASP Asgar Ali Khan of Special Branch (SB), and ASP Abdul Qader Khan and ASP Khalequzzaman of Criminal Investigations Department (CID).

Golam Kibria and Asgar Ali Khan are now staying in Chittagong for the purpose of investigation as SSC question papers were first leaked out at different places in Chittagong district.

Other members of the joint team raided the BG Press on Wednesday afternoon and arrested the two persons suspected to be involved in the question paper leakage.

They also talked to some officials and employees of the BG Press involved in printing and distribution of question papers.

The team members told UNB that they were convinced that the leakage of question paper started from the BG Press.

The police team made a list of the suspects in BG Press and some outsiders as well to interrogate them for finding out the entire ring involved in the racket.

Police said the BG Press started the printing of SSC question papers on December 10, 1997. The distribution was made between February 20 and April 5.

During the time of printing and distribution, the two arrested BG Press employees remained absent from the office several times without the knowledge of the authorities, police said.
