

World Literacy Day Day observed

International Literacy Day was observed all over the country on Friday with a call to impart knowledge of alphabets to all unlettered citizens, reports ENA.

The day observed every year at the call of the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) on September 8 is marked by seminars, symposium and workshops highlighting the efforts, as well as, the ways and means for freeing the world from the curse of illiteracy.

In Dacca, Bangladesh Swakshrata Samity (Bangladesh Association for Literacy) and Bangladesh National Cooperative Union organised two separate seminars in observance of the day.

Speakers taking part in these seminars stressed the need for a country wide mass literacy drive. They suggested that there should be universal and compulsory primary education simultaneously with informal education programme to realise the goal of mass literacy in the country.

The Minister for Manpower Development and Social Welfare was the chief guest at the seminar sponsored by the Swakshrata Samity.

Presided over by Mr. Obaidul Huq, Editor, the Bangladesh Observer, the seminar was also participated by Mr. Anthony Drexler, Secretary for South and South-East Asia of the Family Planning International Assistance (FPIA), Dr. Mizanur Rahman Shelly, Director, Social Welfare, Dr. Osman Gani, Secretary General of the association.

Mr. S. A. Bari AT taking part in the discussion said Government is determined to eradicate illiteracy from the country.

He stressed that educated people particularly the youth should come forward to make the drive a success. He regretted that intellectuals of the country, although conscious,

were showing indifference to the problem.

Mr. Obaidul Huq said, an educated manpower is the driving force behind the national development programme of a country. Education is also the key to physical, material and spiritual development of individuals.

Mr. Anthony Drexler said, knowledge of alphabets among the common people will not only develop the manpower of Bangladesh, but also help contain population explosion.

Dr. Shelly pointed out that an education system which can not ensure livelihood does not appeal the people. So mass literacy drive should be launched with have importance to job oriented education.

Dr. Osman Gani stressed the need for universal and compulsory primary education in order to spread literacy among the younger generations.
