On top of it, the CMH treatment facilities for them have been withdrawn as soon as they retired.

We earnestly request the Adjutant General, and Chairman of the Cadet Colleges and the Ministry of Defence to help rescue the teachers and civil officers in their retired lives on humanitarian grounds. Their contributions to the Armed Forces should not be underestimated. The honourable Prime Minister may be kind enough to reduce the sufferings of the teachers and civil officers of the Cadet Colleges in their hard and difficult times.
