RU remains closed 30 out of 48 months for violence

RAJSAHI UNIVERSITY, June 22:—The academic sessions of Rajshahi University have been lagging behind by more than three years. Now, a student of the university needs at least seven years to complete four-year Master Degree course.

Students lost valuable times of their life due to the problem of session jam. The problem has been created following a series of unscheduled closures of the university due to student clashes and violences.

A survey revealed that a few classes were held in 1986. The survey also revealed that the university was

closed for 242 days in 1987, 256 days in 1988 and 165 days in 1989 due to violences created by student organisations. It is revealed that the university remained closed for two and a half years out of four years.

The university authority has taken up some measures to remove the session jam.

The measures include holding of additional classes, reducing vacations, early publication of results etc.

Prof. Amanullah Ahmed, Vice-Chancellor of the university said that the authority submitted a scheme to the University Grants Commission (UGC) during the last fiscal year along with the proposal for the grant of Taka 60 lakh to solve the problem, but nothing has been done in this respect.

Copying in exam.

BSS reports from Chittagong: Speaker at a seminar on projected student life expressed the views that the teachers would have to play a vital role in eradicating corruption from educational institutions.
