

Pry teachers urged to check drop-outs

The Chief Martial Law Administrator, Lt Gen H M Ershad on Saturday laid the foundation stone of "Prathamik Shikshak Bhaban" at Mirpur in Dhaka describing it as the national recognition of the importance of teachers and their esteemed place in the society, reports BSS.

Gen Ershad said, the present government has always been aware of this ideal and endeavoured to bring an improvement in the present plight of teachers and establish them in the position they deserved in any civilised country.

The CMLA recalled his childhood and the days when he was first taken to the school for primary education. "I still remember the serene face and the affectionate expression of my head master, popularly known as Mofiz Master whose dedication, honesty and love for education and students acted as an inspiration throughout my life. Many days have

elapsed since then and I have been searching for the zeal and ideals of that Head Master. I have found those in you and I want you all to go back to your respective places with the same zeal and ideas which can inspire the future generation to equip themselves with real education and knowledge to become worthy citizens of the country," he asserted.

Gen Ershad said, "It pained me to see the pathetic condition of teachers and educational institutions. It also pained me to see teachers are to come out on the streets for bare necessities of life. It gives me the shock of my life when I see big difference between the honour and professional security enjoyed by the teachers in the advanced countries like Great Britain and United States and those in our country".

He said, "We are determined to change the present situation in new Bangladesh and ensure

a respectable life for our teachers who kindle the light of education and knowledge."

Referring to the plight of primary education, the CMLA said, 60 per cent of the children drop out in between Class I and Class II and hardly 13 per cent reach the Class V level. What a frustrating scene, he questioned adding, "We must do something to reverse this scene. We must save the country from this situation. It is your responsibility to achieve this objective. It is not sufficient to make the primary education universal, compulsory and free. You will have to discharge your duties with total dedication. This is more true after you have been recognised as government employee."

Gen Ershad said, the children of today are the children of an independent country. They will have to be brought up against this background. Our new education proposals aimed at giving real education and making

the future generation capable of facing the challenge of time and meeting the requirements of the country. We need an educational system which can keep pace with the changed requirements and which will help our children to know our country, its history, religion and culture and build it on a solid foundation and earn honour for it."

The CMLA called for united efforts to spread the 'real education' to the nook and corner of the country and make it a better place to live in.

Earlier small school children presented the CMLA with bouquet after an impressive dance and musical performance. Some poems composed by Gen Ershad were also recited.

The primary school teachers greeted the CMLA with welcome slogans and expressed their whole-hearted support to his development programmes.
